This September, CFCI's 7th graders took a trip to Cape Lookout National Seashore. These remote barrier islands are home to a genetically isolated group of wild horses, one of NC's iconic lighthouses, and a diverse ecosystem that

changes with the tides. Students took ranger-lead tours around the island, exploring the dune systems and climbing the 207 steps up to the top of the lighthouse for a breathtaking view. The beaches are kept

Next Thursday, a large majority of our teachers will participate in our first UTOTES (Using The Outdoors To Educate Students) professional development where we will investigate further how to best use the spaces we have to bring learning to life for our kids. We are excited about this opportunity to energize our teachers, in turn engaging our students!



Staying Healthy this time of year!

Parents: Here are just a few reminders as we enter into the cooler months:
