FIRST GRADE CATAPAULT CHAOS

1st grade students tackle NC's Science Standards in true CFCI style. Mrs. Jordan's and Ms. DePrisco's class used the Engineering Design Process to provide hands-on learning opportunities for the Forces and Motion unit. Through the construction of catapults and houses that must withstand wind forces, students were able to demonstrate their understanding of key concepts such as: understanding how forces affect the motion of an object, the correlation of strength of forces to changes in motion, making predictions of motion ranges based on force, and more. They will conclude this unit with the annual 1st grade roller coaster museum.

DID YOU KNOW???

1. Reading is a great stress reliever

Studies show that reading reduces stress by 68%.

2. Reading isn't everyone's strongpoint

An estimated 40% of students are considered poor readers.

3. It all adds up

Reading just 20 minutes a day adds up to reading 1,800,000 words per year.

4. The fastest way to build vocabulary

Children learn 4,000–12,000 words every year by reading.

5. Classroom libraries create bookworms

Kids in classrooms without mini-libraries read 50% less than kids with classroom libraries.

Building upon experiences that demonstrate chronological thinking, our third grade students begin to expand their ability to think like a historian by asking questions that historians ask. Using both primary and secondary sources,

students understand the significant role of the individual in shaping history and explore changes in communities and regions over time.

We visited the Cape Fear Museum to explore Native American artifacts, learn how to use slate boards, and dance the Virginia Reel! 


MIDDLE GRADES ACADEMIES - A CFCI TRADITION

Middle School Academies are a CFCI tradition that teachers and students look forward to. They happen twice a year-- once prior to winter break and then again, prior to spring break. Past academies have included: comic books, cooking, flight, soccer, field sports, reading, rockets, marine science, board games, etc. There is usually an academic component but the idea is to engage students in something that the teacher is passionate about and that students will be curious to learn about. Academies are such a great way to keep our students engaged and learning right before break. They also allow teachers to get to know students in a different learning environment - often one less structured with lots of hands-on activities and collaboration. 
They were able to explain the cause of day and night based on the rotation of Earth on its axis.
