Mrs. McCorcle, Mrs. Mintz, Mrs. Baldwin, Mrs. Bromstead, Mrs. Horne, Ms. R, and Mr. Frank all led this intrepid group up to Reidsville along with a host of brave and positive parent/guardian chaperones - We appreciate you all and simply could not have done this without you.

This program is specially designed to help middle grades experience and develop life skills. Communication, teamwork, cooperation, problem-solving, goal setting, and leadership are not always easily taught in the classroom. The Soaring Thru Spaces Program utilizes ground initiatives, communication exercises, trust-building activities, team challenge course elements (low ropes), and depending on the group the high ropes course to accomplish these learning goals. The High Ropes Course allows students to set goals, push beyond their comfort zone, bask in the support of teammates, and realize their own abilities. The BJP belief is that individuals are often more capable mentally, physically, and emotionally than they actually perceive themselves to be. If given the opportunity to try new challenges in a supportive atmosphere, they will be able to discover the excellence within themselves.

Weekly Wellness with Nurse Jenn and Mrs. Horne

Cooler temps, pumpkin flavored everything, leaves changing colors... Fall has arrived! It also means that flu season is approaching. Although Influenza viruses (flu) are detected year round in the United States, October typically marks an increase in flu activity and lasts through the winter months, slowing down by February (in typical years.)



Getting a yearly flu shot is a great way to help protect yourself. Doctors recommend getting your flu shot by the end of October to best protect yourself before the flu spreads through your community. A common misconception about the flu shot is that you can get sick from receiving it.

can produce some mild symptoms that may be mistaken for influenza. These include soreness, redness, and/or swelling at the injection site, headache, fever, nausea and muscle aches.

The flu virus is spread by droplets. This means when you talk, cough or sneeze, you can spread the virus to others. This is why it is important to cough and sneeze into your elbow and wash your hands often to prevent the spread.

Common symptoms of the flu include fever, body or muscle aches, headache, sore throat, fatigue and vomiting/diarrhea which is more common in children than in adults.

Remember, please keep your student home if they have a fever. They can return to school when they have been fever free for 24 hours without the use of fever-reducing medications.

If your student has diarrhea or vomiting, please keep your students home. They can return to school when it has been 24 hours since their last episode of diarrhea or vomit.

Our Constitutional Convention - Date TBD


We will be rescheduling our Constitutional Convention in the next couple of weeks - stay tuned for the update!

Over the past six weeks of school, our teachers have been working in our classrooms to develop rules and expectations that help our students learn and live together. This week, we will finalize our schoolwide rules that have been developed by representatives from each of the classes. After sharing their classroom rules last week, students worked together to decide the schoolwide rules that would best align with their classroom rules and give all students a sense of belonging. We look forward to creating visible artwork that represents our rules to hang in the hallway of our school. The rules will be presented to the entire school at the end of the week. Everyone will sign the rules as a way of committing the the schoolwide rules that have been created. Engaging all of students in the rule-setting process helps them take ownership of the rules. Engaging all of the adults emphasizes for the children the significance of their work. Together, we are creating a calmer, happier place for learning.



Articulating hopes and dreams

The teacher helps students set goals for the year, often beginning by sharing her/his own goals.



Generating rules

Teacher and students collaborate to generate rules that allow all class members to achieve their hopes and dreams.



Framing the rules in the positive

The teacher works with students to turn rules about what not to do into ones about what to do; for example, "Don't run" might become "Move safely."



Condensing the list

The teacher helps students consolidate their long list of specific rules into three to five broad classroom rules. Students make a poster of the rules and display it prominently in the room.

Teachers find over and over that this investment of time and effort is well worth the payoff of calm, productive, and joyful classrooms.
